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The Why



Federal Requirement

 The Office of Exceptional Children (OEC) is federally required by the U.S. Department of Education to survey parents of children receiving special education services under the Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

 The OEC must report the collected survey data in Indicator 8: Parent Involvement on the annual federal State Performance Plan (SPP).

Inquiring minds want to know ...

Do parents perceive that:

- They play an integral role in assisting their child's learning;
- They are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school;
- They are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision-making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child.

It benefits the PSU, not just the State

- Provides perspective on parent's perceptions about their involvement
- Identify strengths and areas of improvement for the district related to parental involvement
- Opportunity to develop a plan to train / coach / support staff to better engage parents

Indicator 8 Overview

Indicator 8 Overview: results indicator measuring the percentage of parents with a child receiving special education services who report that schools facilitated parent involvement as a means of improving services and results for children with disabilities.

Indicator 8 Goal: improve services and results for students with disabilities by facilitating positive parent involvement

Indicator 8 Measurement: Percent of parents with a child receiving special education services who report that schools facilitated parent involvement as a means of improving services and results for children with disabilities. (20 U.S.C. 1416(a)(3)(A))


Indicator 8 Survey Process



Indicator 8 Survey Process

- PSUs are selected to participate based on a 5 year cycle
 - Indicator 8 Sampling Plan
- Sample includes all parents of students with disabilities on December 1 Child Count for the sample year
- PSU is responsible for disseminating the survey to parents
- The OEC provides support and resources to PSUs




Accessing Child Count Data in ECATS






- Reporting drop list > select Standard Reports





Next Step Reminders



- Generate the child count report. (December 2023 OSEP Child Count)
- Identify methods of dissemination so you are ready to go April 1, 2024
- Identify dates for follow-up and reminders
- Keep track of your responses in real time through the <u>survey tracker</u>
- Set a goal! How many parent responses would you like to get?

What did other districts do?

Feedback from Kanika Griffin, EC Director, Perquimans County Schools ...

- Director met with contacts for each school (IEP chair/leads)
- Asked case managers to follow up with the students on caseload — personal reachout
- At events Set up stations to complete surveys during

PTA meetings/parent nights to address limited Wi-Fi

- If parents did not attend events, they completed surveys in media centers after IEP meetings
- In general, provided computer access for parents



What did other districts do?

Feedback from Mike Marcella, former EC Director, and Jana Dobbins, Watauga County Schools ...

- Director worked with the PowerSchool person in county to develop a compilation of email addresses for all parents with students with an IEP
- Sent 3 email reminders to parents to fill out survey
- Felt they had a good rapport with families because they are a small district so the ask was better received



Tips for Success

- Utilize multiple methods of reminding parents about the survey
 - Flyer send home / post in building / share at IEP meeting
 - Email, snail mail, text
 - Post on district social media
 - Share with district Special Education Advisory Council
 - Have a computer available for parents to complete online survey
 - Have paper copies of the survey at each school
- Engage school personnel who can encourage parents to respond
- Check your response rate prior to end date (7/1)
- Review your survey data



Using your data

- Analyze your survey data thoughtfully
- Look for strengths
- Look for areas of improvement
- Make improvements where needed
 - Engage parents


