2. Enter a description of how the district/charter school will assure that Individualized Education Program (IEP) teams are adhering to the eligibility criteria as outlined in the *Testing Students with Disabilities* publication when determining student eligibility for participation in the alternate assessment.

Stanly County Schools has already begun professional development with all personnel involved in IEP discussions for reviewing eligibility criteria for NCExtend 1 assessments. This continuing professional development will target special considerations for how IEP teams determine eligibility and students meeting criteria in addition to how parents are notified so that they have a firm understanding of the ramifications of taking the alternate assessment. This process was outlined in the April 18 memo from the Exceptional Children's Division in response to the justification required for exceeding the 1% participation.

Prior to administering the NCExtend 1 alternate assessment, Stanly County Schools mandates that all test alternate assessment administrators attend a joint training session between the Exceptional Children's and Testing/Accountability Departments to ensure that all participants have a firm understanding of the criteria, format, and administration of the NCExtend 1 alternate assessment. At this present time, internal audits of individual folders, in addition to other targeted compliance checks, are conducted to verify that proper steps, in the correct sequence, were taken in the placement of any student on the extended content standards. At this time, there are no students being instructed with the extended content standards that are spending more than 80% of their time in the regular education classroom. The internal audit looks for evidence of data driven team decisions for instruction and assessment through present levels of academic and functional performances resulting in measurable annual goals in IEPs

We will continue this training next year to ensure that our IEP teams are making the best, data-driven decisions while taking into consideration the whole student and adhering to the eligibility criteria outlined in the *Testing Students with Disabilities* handbook when determining a student's eligibility for participation in the alternate assessment.

Stanly County Schools anticipates that we will exceed the 1% cap in all grade levels for the 2017-18 school year. We have analyzed student enrollment data as of the April 11 Membership Last Day report to create the chart below.

• Plans for how disproportionality will be addressed:

Stanly County Schools will review the process for reliability and validity of the students eligible for assessment on the NCExtend 1 according to the memo dated April 18, 2018. If students are appropriately identified and meet the criteria of being significantly cognitively disabled, then gender, race or area of disability cannot be considered a deficit issue for Stanly County Schools.

4. Enter additional justification of variables not covered but deemed essential to understanding why the district/charter school has a higher rate of alternate assessment participation.

As we have already stated, Stanly County Schools is a small district with an enrollment of 8201 in grades K-12 as of April 11, 2018. Enrollment in a specific grade level could range from 463 in our smallest district grade level to our larges class of 681 (our current 5th grade). These smaller sizes mean that 1 student (in our smallest class going from 4 to 5 students on the alternate assessment) can impact the 1.0% cap. In addition, district enrollment has been impacted the last few years by a local charter school, private schools, and an influx of home schools operating in our county, thus reducing the enrollment numbers of students. These small enrollment numbers are reflective of how one or two students impact the sample size, thus pushing us over the 1% cap.

An additional variable that impacts our district is that we serve students who are residents of a specialized group home which houses students from all over the state of North Carolina. In 2017-18 there were five students from this home that were eligible for the Extended Content Standards and thus the NCExtend 1 Alternate Assessment as decided by their IEP teams.
