Finding Detail: Production records during the month of review (January 2025) indicated multiple days with zero (0) in the leftover column for vegetables, fruits and meat/meat alternate and grain components. On January 27, 2025, the production record indicated a substitution was made for potatoes (Starchy vegetable subgroup) with a Dark Green and a Red/Orange vegetable. On January 28, 2025, the production record indicated a substitution for green beans (Other vegetable subgroup) was made with a Dark Green vegetable. On the day of review, February 12, 2025, raisins were substituted for the planned mixed fruit. This potentially leads to the question were all K-8 Meal Pattern components, including the vegetable subgroups, available to all students.

Finding Detail: According to 7 CFR 210.8(a)(1) and 7 CFR 220.11(d)(1), every school year, prior to February 1, each School Food Authority (SFA) with more than one (1) school must perform no less than one (1) on-site review of the meal counting and claiming system and readily observable general areas of review identified under 7 CFR 210.8(h) in each school operating the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and 50% of schools operating the School Breakfast Program (SBP) under its jurisdiction. The SFA completed the on-site monitoring review for breakfast service at twenty (20) out of the thirty-six (36) sites prior to February 1, 2025. Observation of the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 school year on-site monitoring breakfast reviews was not conducted at five (5) school sites (AB Middle School, B Everett Jordan Elementary School, Grove Park Elementary School, Pleasant Grove Elementary School, and Woodlawn Middle School).

Finding Detail: The School Food Authority was not adhering to their warehouse food safety plan. Frozen, refrigerated and dry food stored in the central warehouse and freezer were not dated with a received date, hindering the effectiveness of the inventory management system. In addition, the Storage Room Assessment was not completed for the two (2) locations where dry foods are stored.
