# **Program Operations Information**

### Check Out Breaking News - Additional Time for Triennial Assessment

On June 11, 2021, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) issued the Nationwide Waiver of Local School Wellness Policy Triennial Assessments in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs to provide LEAs with additional time to focus on wellness activities. The new deadline to complete a triennial assessment is June 30, 2022. The second triennial assessment would be due by June 30, 2025. This waiver has been added to the USDA Waiver section in the School Nutrition Technology System (SNTS). School Food Authorities (SFAs) can opt into the waiver by going to their application, selecting USDA Waivers list, and selecting "Participating in waiver." They can also opt to select "No waivers have been received" if they will not participate in the waiver. School Nutrition Specialists will review this waiver during upcoming Policy Updates. ### **Plan for Summer P-EBT**

The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) was recently approved to continue the Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) through Summer 2021. Summer P-EBT is an extension of school year 2020-21 benefits. Eligibility will be determined based on student or child circumstances as of the last full month of the 2020-21 school year (May 2021). Eligibility for the summer period is not determined based on school attendance or learning mode, therefore students attending summer learning programs will be eligible for the full summer P-EBT amount. Eligible children will receive a one-time payment of \$375 that will cover the entire summer period of June through August 2021. Children who are eligible as of May will receive their benefit in late July. Children that become newly eligible over the summer by applying for and being approved for Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) or free or reduced-price school meals will receive their benefit in late September.

The NCDHHS <u>website</u> offers P-EBT information and resources. Summer P-EBT outreach toolkits will be provided to schools in early to mid-June. Additional summer toolkit materials will be provided prior to the first summer issuance (end of July). Please work with your local Public Information Officers (PIOs)/Communications Teams to coordinate outreach to families.

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### **Ensure Certified Food Protection Managers are On-site**

The N.C. Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) issued a memo notifying local health departments and food service establishments that starting July 1, 2021 points will be deducted if there is not a Certified Food Protection Manager (CFPM) on-site with a current certificate during an inspection. COVID-19, it was difficult for Certified Food Protection Managers to main a current certificate over the past year. Given this, food safety inspectors in North Carolina paused deducting points for not having a current certificate to allow time for renewal. This memo rescinds the flexibility provided during COVID-19.

The North Carolina Food Code requires FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS to have a PERSON IN CHARGE (PIC) who is a CFPM on site at all times the establishment is in operation. To verify the PIC has an approved CFPM certification, as specified in Paragraphs 2-102.12(A) and Section 2-102.20 of the N.C. Food Code Manual, the PIC must have successfully passed an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) accredited CFPM examination.

Several organizations offer ANSI accredited exams which will provide the certification required by the Food Code. It is important to remember it is successful passing of the EXAM, not participation in a COURSE which provides the certification. Below is a listing of currently approved exams and some of these organizations offer online proctoring and/or online course instruction. It is not a requirement to participate in a course to take an exam although doing so may increase successful exam scores.

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### **Update Contact Information**

The N.C. Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI), School Nutrition Division is in the process of updating the <u>directories for School Food Authorities</u>. Please ensure that your local contact information is correct in the School Nutrition Technology System.

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### Using ESSER Funds, Summer School, and School Nutrition Expenses

Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) I, II, and III funds can be used for atypical School Nutrition related expenses that are a result of COVID-19. With the additional School Nutrition expenses associated with summer school due to COVID-19, there may also be eligible excess typical expenses if the federal reimbursement for meals served doesn't cover the total cost. Things to remember when using these funds for School Nutrition expenses:

- 1. If your organization is considering using ESSER funds for School Nutrition related purposes, please ensure your application has indicated this type of usage.
- 2. A federal reimbursement for meals will be provided for summer school related meal services and must be used first to pay for the typical expenditures associated with these meals. School Nutrition federal reimbursement typical expenses include salaries, benefits, supplies, materials, and food expenses associated with the preparation of meals.

- 3. ESSER funds should not be used towards typical expenses that are covered through the federal reimbursement for meals served unless the reimbursement is insufficient to cover the costs incurred by the program. In the event there are excess expenses and to avoid the risk of duplicate payments, the organization should determine the amount of typical expenses that may be covered through these funds on a monthly basis. To determine if there are excess costs the organization must:
  - Identify Federal Meal Reimbursement Revenue Remaining from the prior month reconciliation
    - Add: Actual Federal Meal Reimbursement Revenue (received in current month for the prior month)
    - Subtract: Current Actual Meal Expenditures
    - Equals: Excess Costs or Additional Meal Reimbursement Revenue (excess cost may be reclassified to ESSER)
- 4. Atypical school nutrition related expenses that are not allowable or typically reimbursed under the meal reimbursement revenue, can be directly charged to ESSER, if approved in the plan and funds are available.

The NCDPI, School Nutrition Division can provide additional guidance related to the monthly reconciliation if needed. Federal Programs should be contacted for ESSER related questions.

### Use Eligible Student Summary Report (ESSR) Data for the 2021-22 School Year

The Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22 Eligible School Summary Report (ESSR) will be based on poverty data from the 2019-20 school year. A best of Economically Disadvantaged Student (EDS) data file has been provided from NCDPI Accountability to Testing Coordinators in public school units (PSUs) to use as a resource and possible data set. The highest EDS rates for the 2020 school year were compiled by comparing rates from three EDS collections and pulling the higher of the rates throughout the year. The EDS data file is reported by school(s) and provided directly to each PSU.

The file is located on the Accountability Secure Shell in the root of the 2020 folder and is PSU specific. The file name is Title1\_EDS\_Rates\_\*\*\*.xlsx. The Testing Coordinator should download this file and securely provide it to Title 1 personnel. This data is provided as an aid in completing the upcoming ESSR.

The 2019-20 poverty data must be used in conjunction with 2020-21 Average Daily Membership (AMD) to complete the ESSER in PowerSchool. If you should have any questions, please contact Alex Charles (alex.charles@dpi.nc.gov).

### Employ Redesigned HACCP – Commercial Kitchen Resources

The <u>Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) Plan for Commercial Kitchens</u> has been redesigned with the following goals to assist our North Carolina School Nutrition Teams:

- Promote ease of completion by managers and staff,
- · Decrease time spent managing the plan,
- Minimize findings and corrective action during Technical Assistance and Administrative Reviews,
- Continue to meet Federal and State requirements, and
- Manage printing requirements.

What changes were made?

- Overall Resources and instructions were separated from forms to manage print requirements. The Food Code references were updated as needed, highlighted in yellow.
- Part 1 Forms were removed. Instead of printing all the forms, some records may be maintained electronically.
- Part 2 Forms were added.
  - o 2A-Annual Revision Reviewed and revised if needed annually.
  - o 2B-Annual Completion Completed annually.
- Part 3 Monitoring Logs were organized by month instead of piece of equipment.
- Part 4 All employee related forms and continuing education are now included.
- Part 5 Minimal clarifications were made.

NCDPI School Nutrition Specialists will review the redesign during upcoming Zone Policy Updates. Updates to the Transport, Homestyle, and Warehouse HACCP Plans are scheduled for SY 2022-23 pending success/feedback of the commercial plan redesign.
