Complete the SFSP Required Annual Continuing Education (R.A.C.E.) Online

NCDPI is pleased to announce that the 2024 Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) Required Annual Continuing Education (R.A.C.E.) online training course is now open. Completion of R.A.C.E. online by at least two individuals is required to submit the SFSP application. The R.A.C.E. online training course must be completed by **February 29, 2024**. The program application is due on or before **March 1, 2024**.

What you need to know:

- **R.A.C.E.** is required for SFSP Sponsors. R.A.C.E. is optional for Seamless Summer Option (SSO) Sponsors.
- New this year Content is streamlined with one (1) main course for all Sponsors: Eat and Learn NC 2024.
- Sponsors who use a vendor for meals have an additional short course, Informal and Formal Purchasing, which will be available after the main course is completed.
- The courses are self-paced, online, and through Canvas.

What you need to do:

- Identify at least two (2) individuals with administrative responsibilities to complete the R.A.C.E. course.
- Determine if a NCDPI, School Nutrition Canvas account for each person exists or is needed. Set up an
 account, if needed. Instructions to create a Canvas account are provided below.
- Access the course. Read below to learn how to access the course on Canvas.
- Complete all required Modules. Upload your certificate into the School Nutrition Technology System (SNTS)
 SFSP application.

Follow the instructions below to access or create a Canvas account:

Already Have a Canvas Account?

- If you have a NCDPI, School Nutrition Canvas account, log into <u>Canvas</u> first. If you need a login refresher, utilize the <u>How to Login to My Canvas Account Quick Reference Guide</u>.
- If you have forgotten your password, please email Donna Knight, <u>donna.knight@dpi.nc.gov</u>, to have it reset.
 Do **NOT** use the reset link in Canvas.
- Next, click to access the Eat and Learn NC 2024 course and select "Enroll in Course".

Need a Canvas Account?

- If you do **NOT** have a NCDPI, School Nutrition Canvas account, an account must be created before you can access the course. Please <u>register</u> for a Canvas account.
- Once the registration form is complete, your new Canvas account will be created. Each new user will receive a confirmation notice from Donna Knight and a Canvas email notification to "Finish your registration". Please allow 2-3 business days for this process. If you do not receive a communication in that time period, check your spam/junk email and/or contact Donna Knight, donna.knight@dpi.nc.gov.
- Follow the Canvas email directions to finish registration.
- When you have a Canvas login, you can follow the instructions under Already have a Canvas account? above to access the course.

Once inside the course, familiarize yourself with the course structure and begin the modules. Modules 100-110 are required for everyone. Then, a survey will direct vended sponsors and vendors to an additional short course, Informal and Formal Purchasing, which goes into more detail regarding purchasing and vended requirements. Upon completion of all modules, you will respond to a final evaluation survey and receive a certificate. Save your certificate on your computer, upload a copy into the School Nutrition Technology System (SNTS) as part of your application, and maintain a copy as part of documentation.

Completing the Non-Congregate Meal Application Process

The Congressional Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 required the Secretary of Agriculture to make available an option to states to provide summer meals for non-congregate meal (NCM) service in rural areas where no congregate meal service is available. This Interim Final Rule amends the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), Seamless Summer Option (SSO) regulations to codify the flexibility for rural program operators to provide NCM service in the SFSP and SSO, collectively referred to as the Summer Nutrition Programs.

Sponsors interested in participating in rural NCM service for the summer of 2024 must apply to be eligible. Complete the <u>form</u> to begin the process with a NCDPI, Summer Nutrition Consultant. The full application process includes multiple steps to determine Sponsor eligibility and capacity to serve rural non-congregate meals and establishes an integrity plan to guide NCM operations.

Note: Potential meal sites must be classified as **RURAL** to operate in a non-congregate fashion. Completion of the interest form does not constitute NCM approval from the State Agency. Additional items are required for NCM approval including an integrity plan, completion of a webinar, and meal site application(s). Get Ready for the N.C. K-12 Culinary Institute – Apply by 3/1

The NCDPI, Office of School Nutrition, in conjunction with Chef Cyndie Story and the K-12 team, will be offering six North Carolina K-12 Culinary Institute regional workshops during the summer of 2024. The Institute is intended for School Nutrition professionals who are currently managing and/or responsible for the supervision of site-level nutrition operations (e.g., School Nutrition Managers and School Nutrition Assistant Managers). The purpose is for participants to master fundamental culinary skills to enhance school meals and be empowered to teach-it-forward to their team members at the local level.



The N.C. K-12 Culinary Institute is a wonderful opportunity for School Nutrition Managers! These workshops will prepare participants to serve as Chef Ambassadors in their districts and beyond. Selected workshop participants will learn fundamental culinary techniques such as knife skills, food production strategies like batch cooking for quality, quick-scratch cooking techniques, and merchandising tips for new K-12 Chef-developed recipes specifically for North Carolina schools. Participants will also learn effective teach-it-forward techniques so they can communicate new knowledge and skills with others in their districts.

The objectives for the Institute are to:

- Improve student health, well-being, and academic success through nutritious, appealing meals at school,
- Increase participation in high quality, enticing school nutrition programs,
- Expand capacity of local school nutrition programs to purchase, prepare and serve fresh, locally grown produce,
- Increase consumption of fruits, vegetables, and whole-grain rich foods, and
- Provide continuing education opportunities for school nutrition personnel.

The N.C. K-12 Culinary Institute workshops will be hosted by School Food Authorities (SFAs) across the state and facilitated by the N.C. K-12 Culinary Institute team, including State Agency staff. The following workshops will be offered this summer:

- August 6-8 Alamance-Burlington School System



Through the Whole Kids Foundation Garden Grant program, schools and non-profit organizations turn outdoor spaces into powerful hands-on learning gardens that connect kids with food, spark their curiosity, and support classroom curriculum. Their grant program provides a \$3,000 monetary grant to support a new or existing edible educational garden located at a K-12 school or non-profit organization. The application deadline is March 1. Learn About and Apply for RFA on Supporting the Use of Traditional Indigenous Foods in the Child Nutrition Programs – Due 3/18

USDA has announced a Request for Applications (RFA) for the <u>Supporting the Use of Traditional Indigenous</u> <u>Foods in the Child Nutrition Programs Cooperative Agreement</u> on <u>Grants.gov</u>. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024, USDA, Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) will award \$2 million in total grant funding to up to four (4) organizations to provide regionally focused training and technical assistance (TA) to School Nutrition professionals on procurement, preparation, and crediting of traditional Indigenous foods, including the use of cooperator and FNS-developed resources and tools. The cooperators, with FNS guidance and approval, will also develop culturally relevant nutrition education materials for students to accompany the traditional Indigenous foods that are served, and the cooperators will train School Nutrition professionals and other school staff on providing nutrition education to students.

The Lead Applicant entity must be led and staffed primarily by members of Federally Recognized Tribes and/or Native Hawaiians but may have partners that are not. Eligible entities include non-profit organizations; School Food Authorities that participate in the National School Lunch Program; tribal government owned entities, arms, or instrumentalities; Native Hawaiian Organization as recognized by the Department of the Interior; and/or other non-governmental entities including Tribal Colleges & Universities. Applicants must demonstrate existing relationships, experience and expertise in training, TA, School Nutrition, Indigenous foods, and nutrition education. Fiscal sponsorships of eligible entities are allowed.

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To file a program discrimination complaint, a Complainant should complete a Form AD-3027, USDA Program Discrimination Complaint Form which can be obtained <u>online</u>, from any USDA office, by calling (866) 632-9992, or by writing a letter addressed to USDA. The letter must contain the complainant's name, address, telephone number, and a written description of the alleged discriminatory action in sufficient detail to inform the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights (ASCR) about the nature and date of an alleged civil rights violation. The completed AD-3027 form or letter must be submitted to USDA by:
