In 1966 the Aurora School and Aurora High School merged to serve both black and white students. The Aurora School campus served grades kindergarten to 8th grade, and Aurora High served grades 9-12. In 1970 the Aurora School was renamed for S.W. Snowden who was a dedicated principal from the 1940s to the 1960s. Aurora High School was renamed Aurora Middle School as sixth, seventh and eighth graders from S.W. Snowden now attended Aurora Middle School. In 2007, S.W. Snowden was closed and an addition was made to Aurora Middle School to house pre-kindergarten to 5th grade. At this point Aurora Middle School was renamed S.W. Snowden. The community was severely damaged by Hurricane Irene in 2011.

(https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ENND3qNmB $\,$ Y) $\,$ Many homes were lost and many parents were forced to leave the area in search of housing and employment. Since 2000, the overal population in the area has declined by 11% to a population of 512 in the town of Aurora. The most recent census indicates that two thirds of students are being raised by a grandparent or other relative. Approximately 46% of residents rent their homes. At this time, our 100% of our students qualify for free lunch and 95% of our students remain at school until 5:00 pm to participate in our after school program. At this time, no students are identified as Academically or Intellectually Gifted. For this reason, our staff began to look at resources like U-Stars Plus that helps teachers observe and serve underrepresented students. Sign-in sheets kept for school events show historically poor community and parent participation in school events. These sign in sheets and photographs document at least a 50% improvement this year compared to the a low trend during the last 5 years. Community members and remaining staff attribute this change to the strategies listed under Goals 2 and 3 in this year's Action Plan. The Leadership team at S.W. Snowden analyzed the AMO Targets for each subject against the AMO Targets Summary for the last 3 years and saw a similar trend as this past school year. Out of a total of 15 Targets, 9 were achieved (60%). It is significant to note that The AMO Targets for Science Grades 5 through 8 and Attendance were achieved at 100%. The 2015 EOG Achievement data indicated 37 % for Reading, 22% for Math, and 29% for Science. The overall Achievement Score was 29%, which is significantly lower than the State and LEA Achievement scores. 2014 Data showed that 10 out of 18 targets were met with total proficiency of 32%, readiing proficiency at 31%, Math 24% and science 47%. In 2013, 11 out of 15 targets were met. The school's performance composite was 22.9%, Reading 66% Math 83% amd science 50%. The data revealed a limited amount of specific root causes in addition to poverty, a high minority population of of 78% and a 24% decline in student numbers over the last 5 years. Some of the decline in numbers is also due to increased numbers attending a charter school in a neighboring county. Attending students are bused from a local business near our public school. In breaking down historical data for the last 5 years with limited subgroups, it is clear that Black and Economically Disadvantaged students are in need of improvement in all academic areas. However, the marked decline in scores over recent years may also be attributed to the high turnover rate among teachers. Over the last 5 years, an average of 50 % or more of the teachers had at least 5 years experience. However the high turnover resulted in a significant lack of continuity in instructional delivery. It is for those reasons the decision was made to hire two new administrators, 8 new teachers, and a new school counselor. Commuting teachers currently receive a travel allotment as a teacher retention incentive. This new group of professionals, coupled with the extensive skill sets of the remaining staff at Snowden is creating a culture marked with synergistic enthusiasm, teamwork, and collaboration among allstakeholders. Additionally, among our students with disabilities population, only 12% achieved passing scores. This is significantly low. As a direct result, all students with IEP's have been re-evaluated by our EC teacher and certified team. Adjustments have been made as

Historical data for home bound students shows an increase in out of school placement until this school year. 2010-2011 -1 student, 2011-2012-1 student, 2012-2013 -3 students, 20013-2014-5 students, 2014-2015- 5 students. This year, NO STUDENTS are currently classified as homebound. This is due to successful interventions and support systems in place. Recorded behavior incidents and their severity have also declined since 2010-11. During that year, there were 247 incidents of disruptive behavior, 17 incidents of agressive behavior, 114 innaproppriate language/disrepect, 3 weapons possessions, and 27 incidents of fighting. In 2014-15, there were only 86 incidents of aggressive behavior, 8 assaults on students and 6 acts of bullying. There were 62 out of school suspensions. So far this year, there have been NO out of school suspensions. An other very encouraging portion of the data that indicates an opportunity for S.W. Snowden to leverage upon is the Attendance Rate for the first grading period of the 2015-2016 school year. Our overall attendance rate is currently 96.79%. This significantly high attendance rate points to a school population that values the educational process. The realized increase in parent/grandparent involvement in school activities and events has had a measurable positive effect on the overall morale and attitude of all. Research that indicates that students who have conceptual mathematics knowledge are more likely to succeed in the current and future workforce. The curriculum has changed in order to provide students with the conceptual knowledge they will need when they enter the workforce. These changes to mathematics curriculum and pedagogy are not enough to reach all students, especially those who are academically low. Both Trans Math and Number Worlds were created to help teachers meet the mathematics needs of all students. The curriculums are based on a solid foundation of special education and general education. These programs are currently used to address deficiencies at SW Snowden on a daily basis. TransMath was created to help teachers meet the mathematics needs of all students. The curriculum is based on a solid foundation of special education and general achievers. SRA reading is also a researched based program that helps minority and SED students who lack essential language skills for school success. It helps builds proficiency in oral language, vocabulary, comprehension and world knowledge. The impact of these students will be tracked weekly through our data wall, PLC meetings, and data team meetings.
