- 2. STUDENT INFORMATION. Complete all fields below. If your school/school system elects to nominate you to the State level, the Office of the North Carolina Governor's School will use that information for future contact. SAVE YOUR FILE!
- 3. PART 1: GENERAL ESSAY. Read the instructions and enter your essay. SAVE YOUR FILE!
- 4. PART 2: DISCIPLINE SPECIFIC TASK. Read the specific instructions for your area of nomination and complete the assigned essay or audition.
- PART 3: PERSONAL READINESS. Shine! Quality of activities and awards is more important than quantity; note your leadership, dedication, etc. Tell why some of these are meaningful to you, and how you are ready for Governor's School. SAVE YOUR FILE!

6. PART 4: STATEMENTS OF ASSURANCE.

- 7. **SUBMIT** this application electronically to the appropriate local school personnel. DO NOT send it directly to the State. Your school will add the official transcript and other components to create your nomination if they decide to advance it for State-level consideration.
- RECOMMENDATIONS (2). Ask two people (at least one of whom must be one of your current or former high school teachers) to
 each submit an official recommendation. Direct them to the official Recommendation Form on the Governor's School website. They
 must complete their form electronically and send it directly to the Governor's School contact at your school. (They should not send
 Recommendation Forms to you or to the state NC Governor's School office.)

Prompts:

English: Describe a vision of the world as presented in a 20th or 21st century literary work that is fundamentally different from your own. What have you learned from seeing through this lens? How has this impacted your own perception or understanding of the world

Mathematics: Modern mathematics is driven not by a reliance on the concepts of numbers and data, but by the need to ask good questions. With that in mind, what are some questions you hope to have answered by your further study of mathematics? Support your answer with examples that briefly describe how you do math and why you enjoy math.

Spanish: Choose a social issue that exists in both the US and a Spanish-speaking country. Compare how both society's people, laws, and social movements address the issue. Respond in Spanish.

Natural Science: Discuss a scientific concept or idea from the past 10 years that is still considered experimental. If evidence were to overwhelmingly support this new concept or idea, how might it affect the scientific discipline, and society as a whole?

Social Science: Select a thinker, writer, or influential person whose work you believe does not receive enough attention or study in today's society. Explain why a specific work or action by this person is important, how it could be studied by people with different perspectives, and what this person's work could better help us understand about today's society.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Students must meet the requirements below to be considered for selection to the NC Governor's School.

- 1. Be a North Carolina resident,
 - Exchange students are not eligible.
 - Students attending a NC federal high school (ie Lejeune High School), regardless of residency, are eligible to apply if they meet the
 other eligibility requirements.
- 2. Attend a North Carolina public or non-public school, and
- 3. Be enrolled in Grade 11 at the time of nomination. Exceptions are made to allow for students in tenth and eleventh grades in Dance, Choral Music, and Instrumental Music.

Starting with the application process for the 2024 session, to be eligible to apply to the NC Governor's School, a student must meet one of the criteria listed below:

- Cumulative unweighted GPA of 3.25 or higher; or
- Cumulative weighted GPA of 3.5 or higher; or
- Score of 4 or higher on an NC End of Course assessment; or
- Score of 3 or higher on an Advanced Placement exam; or
- Grade of B or higher in a Career College Promise course on the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement, or a University Course; or
- Minimum composite score of 19 on the Pre-ACT/ACT or a minimum score of 1010 on the PSAT/SAT; or
- Minimum score of 90th percentile on aptitude assessment (composite or subtest).

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
