





TIP SHEET: CHILD COUNT AND ELIGIBILITY

Essential Questions	Initial
When do I initiate the process?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Suspect Disability OR • Out of State Transfer
Must I complete evaluations (testing)?	<p>YES If there are no current relevant, and existing data for the NC required screening/evaluations for each suspected disability.</p> <p>NO If there is current, relevant, and existing data for the required screening/evaluations for each suspected disability needed to establish eligibility and develop the IEP.</p>
What happens to eligibility?	Eligibility is determined once the IEP Team reviews all the required evaluation data.
May I count on Child Count?	Yes, if there is a current eligibility <u>and</u> IEP on December 1 and April 1.
Essential Questions	Reevaluation
When do I initiate the process?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Suspect a change in eligibility OR • Information needed for programming
Must I complete evaluations?	<p>YES If the IEP Team suspects the eligibility category has changed OR the IEP Team requires formal evaluation data for programming.</p>
What happens to eligibility?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No change to eligibility if the purpose of the reevaluation is programming only. • If the IEP Team suspects the disability has changed, then evaluations must be completed. Once completed, the IEP Team must convene for the purposes of eligibility.
May I count on Child Count?	Yes, if there is a current IEP on December 1 and April 1.
Essential Questions	Triennial
When do I initiate the process?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Required every three years to review eligibility AND programming
Must I complete evaluations?	<p>YES If the IEP Team suspects the eligibility category has changed OR the IEP Team requires formal evaluation data for programming.</p> <p>NO If there is current, relevant, and existing data for all required screening/evaluations to establish eligibility and develop the IEP.</p>
What happens to eligibility?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Evaluations must be completed, and eligibility determined before current eligibility expires. • If there is current, relevant, and existing data for all required screening/evaluations at the time of the triennial and the IEP Team agrees that the eligibility category remains appropriate, eligibility can be determined, and the three-year clock is restarted.
May I count on Child Count?	Yes, if there is a current IEP on December 1 and April 1.



ECATS Rules of Completion

EC Process-A new IEP cannot be finalized if the eligibility has expired  **Federal Reporting**-A student may be counted on Child Count if there is a current IEP on December 1 and April 1

Eligibility EXPIRED }
IEP EXPIRED }  **Trouble spot**  *when these two separate rules of completion intersect, a student cannot be counted on Child Count if these two events exist on December 1 or April 1.*

Troubleshooting

Review Local Practices That May Be Problematic

- Is testing required locally for all required screenings/evaluations at initial, reevaluation, and/or triennial, regardless of existing data?
 - We test every other triennial?
 - We test for all required evaluations even if we have existing data that may be current and relevant?
 - We test all *out-of-state* transfers?
 - We test all *in-state* transfers?
- Do we address eligibility at EVERY reevaluation if it is only for programming?
- Do we schedule the triennial reevaluation too close to the eligibility expiration date?
